<b>Top Tips for Stories</b>			<b>Slice of Life Structure</b>	
1. Write about things that are realistic and that you have experienced yourself	Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Covid</li> <li>War in Ukraine</li> <li>A holiday you have been on</li> <li>Being at school</li> <li>Sitting exams</li> </ul>		<b>Setting-</b> Describe a place (one or two paragraphs). Characters- Introduce two characters (one or two paragraphs). <b>Conflict/ Disagreement-</b> Show some kind of disagreement or conflict between the two characters (three or four paragraphs). <b>Resolution-</b> Show the state of the conflict when the characters leave the setting – it may or may not be resolved one or two paragraphs). <b>Setting-</b> Describe the place again (one or two paragraphs).	
2. Create an engaging and effective opening	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>A one word sentence. Eg. Devastated.</li> <li>A question. Eg. Why does this always happen to me?</li> <li>A triple. Eg. Serene, calm and tranquil: the beach stretched out before me.</li> <li>A declarative sentence. Eg. It was the worst day of my life.</li> <li>In media res (in the action). Eg. A shrill cry echoed in the mist.</li> <li>Dialogue. Eg. "I told you not to do that!" dad screamed.</li> </ul>			
3. Create an engaging and effective ending	<b>DO NOT end with 'it was all a dream'</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Cliff hanger</li> <li>Cyclical structure</li> <li>Flash back</li> <li>Flash forward</li> <li>Moral message</li> </ul>	<b>Motif</b>	Examples: Animals, Colours, Directions, Landscapes, Light/darkness, objects, settings, seasons, space, weather, sounds	
4. Use dialogue correctly and create a balance between description and dialogue	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All dialogue must be contained in quotation marks</li> <li>Before the end of the quotation marks ensure you punctuate</li> <li>New speaker new line</li> <li>Include dialogue</li> <li>Only use dialogue if it drives the story forward</li> </ul>	<b>Literary devices to include</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Sensory descriptions</li> <li>Similes, metaphors, personification, imagery</li> <li>Pathetic fallacy</li> <li>Onomatopoeia</li> </ul>	
5. Build tension or a sense of uncertainty	You could use: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Short sentences</li> <li>Repetition</li> <li>A moment where the tension drops</li> <li>Questions</li> <li>Sensory description</li> </ul>	<b>Structural devices to use</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Foreshadowing</li> <li>Cyclical structure</li> <li>Variety of sentence types</li> <li>Variety of sentence openers</li> <li>Variety of punctuation- particularly semi colons, colons, ellipsis</li> </ul>
