Where the Plantagenets came from

- Why they speak French?
- That they controlled large sections of modern France
- **Henry II power and how it changed over his reign:**
- His dominance in Europe over rival Monarchs
 - How the murder of Thomas Becket impacted on his power
 - About conflict between the church and crown
 - About the rebellion of Henry's sons and the role of Eleanor of Aquitaine
- **John power and how it changed over his reign**
 - That John lost much of the Plantagenets Empire in France and the impact this had on his power
 - How taxation and treatment of the Barons led to Magna Carta
 - That his relationship with the church led to him getting excommunicated
 - Magna Carta – what this was and the impact it had on the Government
 - How some of his reforms were positive
 - That the introduction of common Law was a direct result of the Magna Carta
 - How his legacy impacted on the power of the Plantagenets
- **Edward I power and how it changed over his reign**
 - That changes to parliament and legal system (model parliament) led to a change in Government
 - Military campaigns in Wales were a success due to the destruction of the Welsh nobility and the ring of stone
 - Military campaigns in Scotland were a failure – defeat to William Wallace and Roberts the Bruce
- **Henry V power and how it changed over his reign**
 - The Early successes with the Battle of Shrewsbury
 - The gains in his power with victory at Agincourt and the Treaty of Troyes
 - The impact of his death which led to the Wars of the Roses and downfall of the dynasty on his journey to combine the English and French thrones
- **Isabella of France + Margaret of Anjou power and how it changed (She-Wolves - Helen Castor interpretation)**
 - The impact they both had on the power of the Kings
 - Isabella of France and her challenge to Edward II authority which led to him being deposed
 - Margaret of Anjou and her influence/control over Henry VI (Wars of the Roses)
 - The nature of queenship in the Plantagenets reign challenges the idea of women's status as pawns of power to Kings
 - That they were referred to as She-Wolves (Helen Castor interpretation)
